The Library

Utilize your school and local library and librarians to help you with your research.

Librarians are well versed in the types of books that are available within their library - just ask!

Conducting Research

Who is your audience? Who do you think is going to care about the problem?

Identifying your audience will help you figure out what content and information people care about.

Involve more people in your thinking!

Audience

There is much to be learned from interviewing your peers, family, neighbors, etc.

Personal interviews give you a chance to **ask questions** and **gain insights** that may be unique to your personal situation or grievance.

What is considered a good source?

Who is the author and what are their credentials?

Does this website look like it was professionally created (this is a possible indicator of trustworthy information)?

Does the author of this piece cite other sources, or are they just stating opinions?

Note: Wikipedia is not a trustworthy source!

Evaluating the Source

Digging deeper into your original question.

For example, if you are asking yourself: "Why does my town not have a major grocery store?"

Your next question might be: "Is this an issue in other towns near me/in my state?"

Keep asking yourself questions!

Repeat the Process

Now What?

You have asked questions, conducted research, evaluated sources, and compiled information.

Conducting Research: Getting Started

You did it!

Depending on the problem you have researched, you can meet with your school principal, school board, parents, teachers, etc. to help with next steps

You are fully capable of enacting change within your community.
